

























What kinds of inspections do we conduct?

This is not a real Restricted Materials Permit. This is an example used for training.

I understand this operator identification number does not relieve me from liability for any damage to persons or property caused by the use of pesticides. I acknowledge that duly authorized representatives from the County Department of Agriculture or the Department of Pesticide Regulation may, at reasonable times, enter and inspect fields, areas, structures, greenhouses and equipment (including protective clothing and equipment) where pesticides are handled, stored or applied (ref. 3 CCR 6140).

What is an Operator ID (OID)?

An OIN is an "identification" number issued to property operators and entered on their pesticide use report.

The OIN is issued specifically for management of pesticide use data to identify a unique entity.

The CAC issues an OIN to the operator of the property in order to purchase and use pesticides.



Alternatives and Mitigation Measures

<u>Purpose</u>: CCR 6426 requires a permit applicant and their pest control advisor to consider feasible alternatives to the use of restricted materials.



CCR 6000 "Branch location" means any location, other than the principal place of business, operated by a pest control dealer or agricultural pest control operator to carry out licensed activities in California.

3CCR 6618(b). Notice of Applications (for WORKERS)

Notifications required must be given orally or in writing and be completed prior to the use of any pesticide and in ample time for all subsequent notifications to be made and for all persons notified to take appropriate actions.

- (1)Each person performing pest control shall assure that the operator of the property receives notice of the scheduled application. The notice must be in a manner the person can understand and include:
 - (A) The date of the scheduled application;
 - (B) The identity of the pesticide (including spray adjuvants, if applicable) by brand or common chemical name; and
 - (C) Any other precautions printed on the pesticide product labeling or included in applicable laws or regulations related to the protection of employees or other persons during the application.
- (2) The operator of the property shall assure that notice is given to all persons who are on the property to be treated, or who may enter during the application or the period of time that any restrictions on entry are in effect, except for the persons who made or supervised the application for which the notice is intended. The notice must be in a manner the person can understand and include:
 - (A) The date of the scheduled application;
 - (B) The identity of the pesticide (including spray adjuvants, if applicable) by brand or common chemical name; and
 - (C) Precautions to be observed as printed on the pesticide product labeling or included in applicable laws or regulations related to the entry of the treated area.

Notification – to the public

Food and Ag Code §12978.

Pesticide applications on public property which take place on school grounds, parks, or other public rights-of-way where public exposure is foreseeable shall be posted with warning signs. The signs shall be in English and Spanish and shall contain a warning that the area has been treated with a pesticide and that individuals are not to enter the area.

- (a) This section shall apply to all pesticide applications which have worker reentry intervals of at least 24 hours.
- (b) Posting shall be accomplished immediately prior to pesticide applications, and the signs shall be removed within 24 hours after the expiration of the reentry interval.
- (c) Signs shall be posted at regular intervals and at all regular points of public entry.
- (d) The agency with responsibility for the property where the pesticide application is to take place shall post the warnings required by this section.
- (e) The responsible agency may substitute a barrier for the warning signs to exclude public exposure to a treated area.
- (f) This section does not apply to pesticide applications by the Department of Transportation on public highway rights-of-way.

Safety Rules for Pesticide Handlers in Non-Agricultural Settings

The pesticide label, your training, and the Pesticide Safety Information Series (PSIS) leaflets tell you about pesticide dangers at work. You must be at least 18 years old to mix or load a pesticide that requires an air-supplied respirator, a closed system or full-body chemical-resistant clothing.



EMPAGENCY MEDICAL CARE

Your employer must make plans for emergency medical care, efore you start working with pesticides. If you think that pesticides make you sick or hurt you at work, immediately tell your employer. They must make sure that you are taken to a doctor right away. DO NOT TAKE YOURSELF.

If more space is needed to list medical facilities, your employer may attach a list to this leaflet and write, "See attached list" in the above space.

REMEMBER: You DO NOT have to pay for medical care if you get sick or hurt from pesticides at work.



EMPLOYERS: This is the hazard communication leaflet for pesticide handlers. Fill in the blank lines in this leaflet and display a copy of this handout at a central location in the workplace (such as an employee break room). If requested, you must read this leaflet to an employee in a language the employee understands.

WHAT ARE MY RIGHTS?

Your employer must explain your rights to you. If you need help understanding your rights, call or go to your local County Agricultural Commissioner's office, local legal aid and worker's rights organization, union, or the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR).

1 kight to Access and Review Records

You have the right to look at pesticide use records, applicable safety series leaflets, and Safety Data Sheets (SDSs) for all pesticides used in the last two years where you work. A SDS tells you about the pesticide and its dangers. You also have the right to review your training records and any other documents related to monitoring or potential exposure. You must be informed of this location before you handle pesticides and in your annual training.

If this location changes, your employer must prove any tell you of the new location.

2. Right to Worker's Compensation

If you get sick or hurt BECAUSE OF YOUR JOB, you have the right to file for worker's compensation. Worker's compensation will pay for your medical bills, and sometimes, lost pay.

3. Right to Obtain Information

You, your doctor, or your representative designated in writing can receive information about your pesticide exposure or any other pesticide record your employer is required to keep.

4. Right to Report Unsafe Conditions

Pesticide safety for workers is the top priority of the County Agricultural Commissioner and DPR. You have the right to report unsafe pesticide work conditions and suspected use violations without being punished or fired. Your employer will not be told who made the complaint. Your statements about the safety problems must be checked out right away.

5. Right to Be Protected From Retaliation

You are protected from being fired, from discrimination, and from any retaliatory action due to the exercise of any of your rights.

HOW CAN I TELL WHICH
PESTICIDES ARE MORE
DANGEROUS?

Most pesticide labels have a signal word ("Danger," "Warning," "Caution") on the front of the label. This word tells you about the acute health effect of the pesticide.

IF YOU THINK

pesticides have made you sick at work, immediately tell your employer. Your employer must make sure that you are taken to the doctor IMMEDIATELY.







SPM - Urban Subgroup

While most people associate pesticide use with agricultural settings, there is significant use and impact in urban settings.

Nonagricultural uses

35-55 % of pesticide sales (pounds sold)

16-19 % of reported pesticide use (#s applied by licensed applicators)

65-75 % of reported pesticide-related illnesses.

DPR invited nine leaders to collaboratively develop guidance on where and how to focus DPR resources, as well as other recommendations for ways that DPR and other entities might support urban sustainable pest management in California.
